Take a gift along with you for the host and hostess. It can be food item or any souvenir.

Wear conservative clothes in order to maintain decorum and sobriety.

You should be polite in your manners.

Leave some food in your plate and wipe your hands using the towel provided.

Keep your valuable belongings in a secured place like the hotel safe.

If you are on a business meeting, exchange your business cards using both your hands.

DON'Ts: Living in HONG KONG

Do not forget to carry your passport and keep it with you.

Do not forget to respond when you are greeted by someone.

Do not reveal your anger or temper in public places.

In case of any invitation or appointment, try not to be late at all.

Do not commence your dinner until you are indicated to do so and do not hold your chopsticks upright, as it is considered unlucky.

Do not put on garments exposing too much skin.

Do not express any bad comments regarding someone or something.

Stay away from political and religious arguments.

Do not deal with loan sharks. Do not pawn your passport.

Do not use your passport as collateral for loan. Taking double jobs is not allowed.

Do not take snapshots of airport, certain religious and public buildings.

Do not bring any kind of addictive and harmful drug materials to the city.

Do not bring the following in HK:

1. Drugs like opium, morphine, heroin, cocaine, cannabis, methadone, psychotropic drugs like stimulants, Amphetamine, Ecstasy, Benzodiazepine, Antibiotics like penicillin, tetracycline, corticosteroid, etc.
2. Chemicals like Acetic Anhydride, ephedrine.
3. Arms and weapons, grenades, firecrackers, and other explosive items
4. Animals and plants
5. Endangered species
6. Diamonds
7. Meat like pork, chicken
8. Cigarette products

Reminder: Your passport is your personal property. It is illegal for your employer to keep it.
